

2016 INFRASTRUCTURE ASSISTANCE COORDINATING COUNCIL (IACC) CONFERENCE

IACC is a nonprofit organization dedicated to helping Washington communities identify and obtain resources they need to develop, improve, and maintain infrastructure. IACC consists of staff from state, federal, and tribal agencies, local government associations, and nonprofit technical assistance organizations. IACC is governed by four board officers and six board members. More information on IACC can be found at www.infracfunding.wa.gov.

One of the ways that IACC works to improve the delivery of infrastructure financial and technical assistance is to hold an annual conference where people can network and learn about infrastructure programs and services. The 2016 IACC Conference was held October 18-20 at the Wenatchee Convention Center. The conference has been held annually since 2003, and before then it was held every other year since the early 1990s. Conference costs are paid with registration proceeds from previous conferences.

More than 320 people attended this year's conference, including elected officials and staff from tribal nations, cities and towns, special districts, water associations, consulting engineers, regulatory agency staff, state and federal funding program staff, nonprofit technical assistance providers, and product vendors.

EXHIBITORS

Thirty-three exhibitors participated in this year's conference, including infrastructure equipment vendors, consulting firms, state and federal agencies, and nonprofit organizations. An Exhibitor Reception was held on October 18, immediately following the final session of the day.

SESSIONS

IACC offered 56 concurrent sessions (some repeated), including presentations on funding programs, regulatory issues, case studies, panels, and guidance on special topics, plus two field trips. PowerPoint presentations for most of the sessions will be posted at www.infracfunding.wa.gov.

KEYNOTE SPEAKER

The keynote speaker this year was Sandi Doughton, author of *Full Rip 9.0: The Next Big Earthquake in the Pacific Northwest*, and Science Reporter for the Seattle Times.

TECH TEAMS AND ADVISORY SESSIONS

Since 1999, IACC has offered pre-registered technical team ('tech team') meetings to communities to provide input on local priority infrastructure projects. This year, representatives from 15 different communities (tribal nations and local governments) met with regulatory, funding, and technical

assistance program staff. Many more held 'ad hoc' meetings with agency staff during the conference. Projects were at various stages of development. Tech team members assisted with framing infrastructure issues clearly, exploring possible solutions, identifying key regulatory, planning, and financing programs, and answering as many questions as possible.
