What Is the IACC?

The IACC is a nonprofit organization made up of staff from state and federal agencies, local government associations, nonprofit technical assistance organizations, and tribes. IACC is a unique organization that has enhanced the relationships between government agencies and communities in Washington for over 20 years. IACC is operated by four Board Officers and six Board Members.

What Is the Mission of IACC?

The IACC is dedicated to helping Washington communities identify and obtain resources they need to develop, improve, and maintain public works programs. Together with the IACC, communities are better able to provide the infrastructure necessary to enhance, preserve, and protect Washington's environment and quality of life.

What Does IACC Do?

IACC's purpose is to improve the delivery of infrastructure assistance, both financial and technical, to local governments in Washington State. It does this by keeping its members informed of changes in infrastructure programs or services and by providing opportunities to network and gain information:

- IACC sponsors an annual statewide conference where state and federal programs assisting local governments with infrastructure needs convene to share information about their programs with local government representatives.
- IACC provides technical assistance to communities by bringing together the appropriate funding and technical assistance representatives with community members to collaborate on specific projects.
- IACC provides information regarding funding and technical assistance programs by maintaining an online database at www.infracfunding.wa.gov.


