



Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP) and Post-Fire HMGP




HMGP Funding

When a Major Disaster is declared by the President, funding becomes available for HMGP projects.

States with Enhanced Mitigation Plans, like Washington, are eligible for up to 20% of the combined disaster assistance.*

Example: \$100M is disaster assistance, then up to \$20M would be available for HMGP proposals.



HMGP Highlights

- Disaster 4682 was a severe winter storm that hit Washington in early November 2022
- Approximately \$2,658,100.00 in federal funding opened to Washington for hazard mitigation projects
- Priority was given to the declared counties (see map)






Post-Fire HMGP Highlights

- Post-Fire HMGP is determined by the number of Fire Management Assistance Grants (FMAGs) from the previous year
- The 2023 fire season had 8 FMAGs (including the Oct 2022 Nakia Creek Fire) which opened \$13,067,008.00 in funding
- Priority was given to the declared counties (see map)

2023 Fire Management Assistance Grants








HMGP and Post-Fire HMGP Cost Share

Historically Washington has contributed a 12.5% match. Many states do not split the 25% nonfederal cost share.

Local cost share of 12.5% can be cash or documented in-kind contributions.

Federal match is 75%.





HMGP and Post-Fire HMGP Applicant Requirements



Must have an <u>active</u> locally adopted hazard mitigation plan or be annexed into the local county plan.

Should have an <u>aligned</u> mitigation strategy within the plan identifying the proposed project

Flood Mitigation Assistance (FMA)

- Annual grant focused on mitigating structures that are insured through the <u>NFIP</u> and have sustained past flooding claims
- Up to 75% federal cost share funding if a higher cost share is not available
 - 75% Federal share; 12.5% cost-share for WA state and 12.5% cost share for the sub-applicant.
- Up to 90% federal cost share funding if the average Center for Disease and Prevention (CDC) Social Vulnerability Index (SVI) score is not less than 0.5001 for the project benefiting area containing NFIP-insured properties
 - The activity must also be funded by the Bi-partisan Infrastructure Law.
- Priority given to communities with high number of NFIP policies and communities participating in the Community Rating System (CRS)

Briefings for Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC)

Annual Nationally Competitive Grant

- Focused on climate resilience, community based, infrastructures, and non-flood related projects.
- 36-month period of performance once awarded*
- Great for large project types protecting critical infrastructure.
- WA practices 75% federal share and WA share 12.5% and Local share 12.5%.

Funding (FY23)

- \$50M fed share cap on projects, per applicant (competitive).
- \$701M allocated for Hazard Mitigation Projects.
- C&CB up to \$2M, per state or territory.
- Building Code Plus Up, up to \$2M.
- Funding varies by fiscal year

- Incorporate nature-based solutions including those designed to reduce carbon emissions
- Enhance climate resilience and adaption
- Promote equity and prioritize disadvantaged communities
- Increase funding to applicants that facilitate the adoption and enforcement of the latest published editions of building codes












Tokeland Vertical Evacuation Tower
